UM Interprofessional Education (IPE) Elective Offerings Fall 2023

AHHS 470 Friday Morning Medical Conference, 1 cr.

This weekly presentation is provided locally at Providence Saint Patrick Hospital and streamed live. A variety of relevant health care topics are presented by local, regional and national speakers. Students attending will learn about a variety of concepts, medical approaches, and health-care related issues impacting health care practitioners in a variety of settings. To receive credit for the course, a student must attend 10 sessions during the semester for a passing grade. The class will meet in-person each week on Friday mornings from 7:30-8:50am. (CRN 72643)

AHHS 430 Health Aspects of Aging, 3 cr. Online

An overview of health aspects of aging including biological theories of aging, normal physiological changes, common pathological problems, cultural and ethical differences in health of elders, health promotion, healthy aging, and the health care continuum for older persons. Online fees apply. (CRN 71348)

AHHS 450/550 Interprofessional Collaborative Practice, 1 cr.

The primary goals of this seminar course are to bring students from various health care programs into one classroom to learn about interprofessional collaborative practice concepts and further develop skills needed to work as interdisciplinary teams in various health care settings. Students will be engaged through small and large group discussions/activities, relevant reading assignments, and short topic presentations to develop core competencies for IP practice. Class will meet in-person and on Zoom (online) synchronously every other Thursday from 5:15 - 7:15 pm. (CRN 73963/73964)

PSYX 233 Fundamentals of Psychology of Aging, 3 cr. Online


An overview of theories and research findings in the psychology of adulthood and aging. Online fees apply. Course is offered online. (CRN 70933)

PSYX 280 Fundamentals of Memory and Cognition, 3 cr.

Offered intermittently. Prereq., PSYX 100S. The acquisition and uses of knowledge. An examination of research and theories of human learning, memory, and thinking. TR 9:30 - 10:50 am (CRN 71335).

KIN 460: ECG Assessment, 2 cr.

Prereq., junior, senior, or graduate status. Laboratory sessions combined with class sessions to understand electrocardiography and the assessment of electrocardiograms, both at rest and during exercise. TR 10:00 - 10:50 AM. (CRN 71219)





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PUBH 525 Multicultural/Native American Public Health, 3 cr. Online

An overview of multicultural issues within the U.S. and specifically in Montana. The course provides insight to health disparities within the nation and how these disparities disproportionately impact ethnic minority populations. Additional online and program fees exist required. (CRN 72685)

PUBH 530 Public Health Administration and Management, 3 cr. Online

Overview of public health and health care systems; organizational structures, authorities, policies and procedures; programmatic budgeting, operations, program performance reporting and improvement; grants and contracts; informatics; human relations and negotiation; management and leadership; and business planning. Additional online and program fees required. (CRN 71181)

PUBH 591.54 Indoor Environmental Quality Management, 3 cr. Online

This course will focus on environmental problems and issues associated with our homes, office buildings, schools, and other non-industrial indoor environments. This course will also explore the nature and cause of indoor environmental health problems, and the measures used to investigate and control them. (CRN 73181)

AHAT 324/325 Assessment of Athletic Injuries, 3 cr.


Establish foundational knowledge on musculoskeletal injuries, determine a systematic approach to assessing injuries, and study the techniques used when assessing athletic injuries to the upper and lower extremities, including the head and spine. This course includes lecture with hands on laboratory experiences to supplement as it pertains to necessary skills. Lecture: TR 1:00-1:50 and Lab: Thursdays 2:00-3:50. SW 455 Social Gerontology, 3 cr. Online

Examination of the field of social gerontology, including an examination of the major bio/psycho/social/cultural/spiritual theories of aging, the service system, social and health issues, family and care giving dynamics, social policy, and end of life concerns. (CRN 70946)

CSD 396 - Autism on Campus/SvcLrn. 2 cr.

Prerq., junior or senior standing, and consent of instructor. This course educates students about autism in adults. The didactic portion addresses executive functioning and social needs. 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SW 423: Addiction Studies, 3 cr.

Offered spring and summer, online. Examination of substance use disorders and misuse, behavioral compulsions, including alcohol and other drugs, gambling, eating disorders, sexual addictions. Ecosystems perspective on etiology, treatment, prevention, family dynamics, community response, and societal contributors. This course is an elective that satisfies curriculum towards the State of Montana Licensed Addictions Counselor (LAC) credential. Level: graduate and undergraduate. (CRN TBD)

SW 427: Motivational Interviewing, 2 cr.

This blended course will provide foundations for proficiency in understanding and use of Motivational Interviewing (MI). MI will be taught through an inter-professional education (IPE) model as an evidence-based interview practice to support behavior change and enhance the delivery of best practice approaches between client and practitioner in various allied health and human service fields. This course is an elective that satisfies curriculum towards the State of Montana Licensed Addictions Counselor (LAC) credential. Level: graduate and undergraduate. (CRN TBD)
