Submitting Programs & Services for Review

The [Title IV-E Prevention Services Clearinghouse](#) will continue to review programs and services, including those submitted through a public call for recommendations. Their website provides basic information on the review process on their [web page of frequently asked questions](#).

Identification of Programs to Review

- Programs and services will be identified from the following sources:
- A public call for recommendations on at least an annual basis. The first public call occurred in the fall of 2019 and is now closed.
- Recommendations received in response to the 2018 FRN, federal partners, and other key stakeholders.
- An environmental scan and an inventory of the literature.

Eligibility for Review

To be eligible for review, programs and services must:

- **Address at least one of the four program or service areas:** 1) mental health prevention and treatment programs or services, 2) substance abuse prevention and treatment programs or services, 3) in-home parent skill-based programs or services, and 4) kinship navigator programs.
- **Include a book, manual, or writings.** Programs and services must be clearly defined and replicable. To meet this criterion, they must have available written protocols, manuals or other documentation that describes how to implement or administer the practice.
