Welcome to the UM campus, and good luck in your deliberations!



# KEYNOTE SPEECH "EBOLA: ME, THEM, AND THE UN!"

### PROFESSOR PETER KOEHN



**Dr. Peter H. Koehn** is a Professor of Political Science at the University of Montana. He was named UM's Distinguished Scholar for 2005, has served as a Fulbright New Century Scholar, and received the Association of Public and Land Grant Universities' 2011 Michael P. Malone award for International Leadership and the 2012 George M. Dennison Presidential Faculty Award for Distinguished Accomplishment.

Over the course of his career, he has taught and conducted research in Ethiopia, Nigeria, Eritrea, Namibia, China, Hong Kong, and Finland. Professor Koehn is the founding director of The University of Montana's academic programs in International Development Studies and Global Public Health. He teaches the course "Issues in Global Public Health" every spring semester.


