Advocacy Spotlight:

Social Work Students – Advocate!

Our profession has a rich history of advocacy and social justice (think all that stuff you learned in SW 530!).

Our BSW and MSW UM Social Work programs include students from more than 20 states and 3 Countries (Mexico, Canada, and the US). Wherever you are, there are policy decisions being made. We encourage you to learn about the systems of power and decision-making in your community and state/province.

Where do I even start?

Attend Centering Indigenous Knowledge Web Series

Sponsored by UM and hosted by Montana Campus Compact, the <u>Centering Indigenous</u> <u>Knowledge Webinar Series</u> kicks off Feb. 1 and will run every Wednesday at noon through March. The eight-part series is facilitated by Dr. Karla Bird, UM tribal outreach specialist and member of the Amskapi Piikani Nation (Blackfeet).

As part of its mission to advance the public purposes of colleges and universities and educate students for civic and social responsibility, the MTCC board aims to raise awareness of the rich Indigenous knowledge in Montana and center the people and institutions who lead it.

The web series will inspire people to learn more and seek ways to support tribal colleges and their work to advance and preserve Indigenous knowledge. The webinar will discuss the histories, current offerings, and unique contributions of tribal colleges.

<u>Registration is free</u>, but attendees are encouraged to support via contributions to the presenting institutions or the <u>American Indian College Fund</u>.

Mentoring for BSW Students: Connect with Faculty

Fall semester all BSW students were offered the opportunity to be partnered with a faculty member to engage in professional mentoring partnership.
